One of the early 20th century's most influential cultural impresarios, Carl Van Vechten was a patron and dealmaker of the Harlem Renaissance, a photographer who captured the era's icons, and a novelist who created some of the Jazz Age's most salacious stories. He was a confidant of Langston Hughes, Gertrude Stein, George Gershwin, F. Scott Fitzgerald, and the Knopfs, often to be found in Harlem's jazz clubs, the speakeasies of Hell's Kitchen, and Greenwich Village's underground gay scene. Edward White fully explores Van Vechten's tangled relationships with race and sexuality, family life and romantic trysts, modernist literature and low-brow entertainment. "As Edward White writes in *The Tastemaker*, his ambitious and engaging portrait of a 'polymath' and the world he helped shape, Van Vechten 'collapsed the 19th-century distinctions between edifying art and facile entertainment, constantly probing the boundaries of what was considered good and bad taste.'
